Forty-five people attended a test support meeting in December, and a second meeting was being held at the Black Horse (Charles Wells), Wootton, near Bedford, on Wednesday January 14 1976.

BIG BREWERS ADMIT CAMRA'S INFLUENCE IN 'MORNING ADVERTISER' PROBE

CAMRA's influence as a consumer unit was admitted by several of the Big Six brewery concerns in the licensed trade newspaper, the 'Morning Advertiser', on Monday December 29 1975.

'CAMRA - An Initial Success In So Many Ways' was the headline for a full-page 'probe' feature by staff writer, David Ing.

He said it seemed the campaign had been around for years as a thora in the side of the big brewers.

'It is some four years since CAMRA arrived on the scene. Yet in that time the initials have become as familiar as CID, VAT and even LVA.

'In a relatively short period they have become a powerful independent consumer association, he added.
